# Exciting, Eccentric Edinburgh





By Beth Roulston Editor in Chief From quaint cobbled lanes, to a majestic castle, Edinburgh is a magical city that offers classical architecture, hiking, shopping and lots of other fantastic things to see and do. According to recent findings, the area dates back to 8500BC when the first settlers of Scotland arrived. However, it wasn't until the 14th century that Edinburgh became the official capital of Scotland.

Edinburgh offers the perfect blend of city and countryside. Whilst meandering through high-end fashion stores and quintessentially Scottish gift shops, rolling hills and stunning greenery sit directly behind grand, ancient buildings, presenting a feast for the eyes and soul. For those with active families, follow the hiking trail up to Arthur's Seat where you can take some breathtaking photos of the city. To find the base, walk down the





Royal Mile to the Scottish Parliament and you'll find it just past there. For more adventurous climbers, hop on a bus to visit a more remote area of Scottish countryside. FYI, wild camping is legal in Scotland!

With Edinburgh Castle being one of Europe's oldest fortified places, make sure to take a tour to see it in all its splendour. Then march up and down the Royal Mile, along Princes' Street or wander down Cockburn (pronounced 'Coburn') Street to purchase gifts. The beautiful public parks of Princes Street Gardens are great for kids to run off some steam and for parents to take a romantic selfie or two. The Edinburgh Dungeons offers a funny, yet spooky half-day activity (recommended for children over 8 years old). Expect darkness, loud noises, and ghost stories! If you have time, I recommend a visit to Edinburgh Zoo, which is home to over 1.000 rare animals. Ticket costs for

both of these attractions can be offset with a city pass\*.

If you're travelling with young children, check out the Apex Grassmarket Hotel\*, located in Old Town, which has an indoor swimming pool. For a luxurious and comfortable stay, the Edinburgh Grand offers gorgeous interiors and spacious rooms just a 3-minute walk from Princes Street. Alternatively, Travelodge Edinburgh Central Princes Street is a convenient and wise choice for those wanting to travel on a budget.

Travelling with a baby changes everything, but our trip to Dublin was seemingly easy. It was a great mix of culture, kid activities and nightlife.

As the home to Guinness, it would be a shame to miss a tour of Dublin's Guinness Storehouse. The best part of the tour is the splendid 360-degree view from the bar at the top and the complimentary pint of freshly poured Guinness – oh, and the merch. As a whisky lover, a visit to the Teeling Whiskey Distillery was a must. You get to see the entire distilling process, but, honestly, we really enjoyed the bar afterwards. You can be really cliché and order an Irish coffee.

But Ireland is not just about drinking. At the Chester Beatty Museum, you can see a rich collection from across the world. It's a lot quieter than other museums, so it's great to visit during baby's naptime. You can easily walk to St Patrick's Cathedral and enjoy the gorgeous green grounds, or walk inside to see beautiful Gothic architecture. Nearby is Trinity College, which has one of the oldest campuses in Ireland. It's also worth heading over to Phoenix Park Visitor Centre. Located within Phoenix Park, one of the largest in Europe, they have a playground, café and childfriendly facilities. And no trip to Dublin would be complete without experiencing Temple Street's bar culture. Although, it's best to visit well before 9pm as the crowds tend to get slightly rowdy at night; but definitely go if you like live music!

Lastly, it's worth mentioning that Irish cuisine goes beyond that of potatoes. Any type of stew, fish n'chips or baked mussels is delicious and will warm you up. If you get the opportunity, order some local oysters and wash them down with a gin and tonic. If you decide to stay outside of Dublin at an Airbnb, like we did, it's easy taking the bus into the city. But if you are pressed for time, opt to stay in downtown. There are many fantastic hotels by the major landmarks and the walk along the River Liffey is certainly memorable.

# Rough and Ready Berlin

From the moment I arrived, I knew it was going to be hard for me to leave. There are always new places popping up to keep you entertained, whether you go for three days or a month.

A must-see for every visitor is the 18th Century Brandenburg Gate. Symbolic of the city's historic events, with free admission, it is the perfect place to take some family selfies! Then just a five-minute walk away is the Reichstag, the heart of Germany's parliamentary precinct. Enjoy a cup of tea on the top deck while observing a spectacular view of Berlin. Spend the rest of the afternoon in leafy Tiergarten, Berlin's most popular park, where you can also take your little ones to Berlin Zoo. You could also pay your respects to the past with a visit to the Holocaust Memorial site, a somber place to teach your family about an important yet tragic period in history.

Spend a day exploring edgy East Berlin. Once built to separate East from West, there are various sites where you can see remains of the now fallen, iconic Berlin Wall. The East Side Gallery is home to some of the best murals.

Lastly, no Berlin visit is complete without a trip to Museum Island; a UNESCO world heritage site and categorised as one of the best museums in the world.

In terms of food, Berlin offers a variety of cuisines, with countless delicious dishes from Vietnam, Japan, Turkey and, of course, Germany. Your kids will fall in love with fast food dish Currywurst - an irresistable dish of fried sausage and chips covered in curry sauce.

For first time visitors, I would recommend staying in central neighbourhoods Mitte or Prenzlauer Berg, as most of the key tourist spots are close by and the districts are very well connected. For a place that feels like home, I would recommend the cosy 'art'otel berlin mitte', Berlin.

Family-friendly B&B Hotel Berlin Potsdamer Platz is an affordable and centrally located choice that is perfect for history buffs. For those looking to stay in the East, check out Schulz Hotel Berlin Wall at the East Side Gallery. They offer free WiFi and a lovely beer garden that overlooks the wall.

# Amalfi Coast – A Mediterranean Paradise

When it comes to Italy, often it is cities like Rome, Florence, Venice, Verona, Pisa and Milan that dominate the country's top-rated list of tourist destinations. But there's a lot more to Italy than meets the eye.

Just 72 km south below Naples questionably home to Italy's tastiest pizzas - lies the beautiful Amalfi Coast. Perfect for those looking for it all, this 50-kilometre stretch of coastline offers plenty of things to keep the whole family entertained; whether it is relaxing on the beach, swimming in the sea, shopping, eating or experiencing ancient history.

The area's namesake, Amalfi, is a town rich with history as it was once a busy place for trading around the 8th and 9th centuries. Along with Sorrento, Amalfi provides the perfect 'home base' for either a long or short break as both offer easy transport options to neighbouring towns Positano, Ravello and Praiano, plus they



offer a vast range of lovely hotels, fantastic places to eat, and beautiful beaches.

Here are some of our top favourite things to do while visiting the Amalfi Coast:

Take a boat tour. This is hands down the best way to see and capture the Amalfi Coast from afar. In Amalfi Town, make sure to visit its stunning cathedral in the Piazza del Duomo and wander over to at least one of the gelaterias for a three-scoop cone! Go snorkelling in Punta Campanella to enjoy its turquoise, crystal-clear waters. Bumble through quirky Positano to shop for gifts and souvenirs from local handicrafts shops to extravagant boutiques.

Travel to Pompeii and see one of the most famous volcanic eruption sites in history (Mount Vesuvius) which left an entire city frozen in time. From Amalfi it is about 45 minutes in a taxi or two hours by bus. Visit Capri Island and explore its beautiful cave, the Blue Grotto. The ride from Amalfi or Positano takes about an hour and costs roughly €25 (191 RMB) per person one-way.

For a relaxing, convenient stay we highly recommend family-run Aurora Apartments as it's close to a beach and just 100 metres from Amalfi's town centre. For something away from the crowds, check out the Villa Concetta - a luxurious property that comes complete with its own outdoor pool, dining terraces, and is located just a short walk from the beach.

# Notoriously Luxurious Nice

> The Côte d'Azur, known as the French Riviera, is the scenic coastal region in the south of France, and, with 300 days of sunshine each year, is the ideal dreamy getaway. Nice is known for its glitz and glamour, but with cultural influences from both France and Italy there is more to the city than its lavish lifestyle.

Sightseeing around town could not be easier, with affordable bike rentals on the eastern side of the famous Promenade des Anglais. The easiest route for families is from the Roller Station, located on the Promenade. I went the extra mile and hired a Segway, then ventured into the quaint Old Town where I stumbled upon chic boutiques, restaurants and galleries. If you are a thrill seeker like me, follow a busier, more exciting cycling route north towards the enchanting mountains. Located in the centre of Old Town is the famous Place Saint-Francois market, where you can buy fresh fish on weekends. Saturdays are the perfect day to stroll through the Old Town to Palais de Justice where you can buy second-hand antiques and souvenirs. However, if you're feeling lazy (which, let's be honest, we all do when we're on holiday), take the road train or lift up to Castle Hill which has Castle Park and a kid's playground for your little ones to run around. There are also plenty of charming cafes where you can grab an ice cream and take in the views.

While in Nice, make the effort to hop on a 30-minute train ride and discover Monaco; which FYI costs less than a bag of oranges. Famous for the Formula One Grand Prix, luxurious super-yachts and the notorious Casino de Monte Carlo, here you can tick off visiting the world's second smallest country.

Treat your family to a traditional le pan bagnat (tuna sandwich) from La Gratta Keka, socca (a chickpea crepe) from Chez Pipo; or pissaladière (a baked flatbread) from Lou Pelandroun, all located in the centre of Nice.

Family-friendly Villa Nice Victor Hugo offers a perfect location, situated right by the Promenade des Anglais. Stay at La Perouse for breathtaking views of the Bay of Angels and complimentary breakfasts when you book online. Over 100 years old, the elegant Hotel Negresco offers a comfortable stay for those with fine taste.

It comes as no surprise that the famous English poet Lord Byron described Dubrovnik as the 'Pearl of the Adriatic'. Recently hot on everyone's radar, Croatia's coastal city is eager to please, offering fascinating history, stunning architecture, gorgeously blue waters and wonderfully warm weather. Come and douse vourself in Dubrovnik's sunshine on the picturesque Dalmatian coast.

Stroll around the Old City, a port town since the 15th century and UNESCO World Heritage Site. Expect to find Gothic churches, Baroque architecture and charming plazas dating back to the Renaissance period, demonstrative of the city's eclectic mix of historical influences. For a spot of shopping, head to the main street of the limestone paved Stradun, a fantastic example of their preserved Medieval history. Make sure to walk the city's Old Fort Walls to admire views of the city's terracotta rooftops over the dazzlingly blue Adriatic Sea.

Now Game of Thrones fans, it's time to get your geek on! Dubrovnik's Old Town was used for filming the hit series, so, live out your Jon Snow fantasies and take a themed tour of the real King's Landing. Don't miss the majestic Lovrijenac Fortress.

Take a cheap boat tour and find a spot of sand to call your own. There are countless beaches close by, it would be a crime not to visit them. The plush island of Lokrum is a mere 15-minute ferry ride away. Take a kayak in its crystal clear waters and explore the rock formations of quiet, emerald lagoons. Full of peacocks and rabbits running around, this forested island waits to be explored.

Croatia gives Italian gelato a run for its money, so overindulge on cheap, delicious ice cream (we certainly won't judge you and your kids for that sixth scoop of the day). Due to its coastal location, be sure to try Dubrovnik's seafood. From black risotto to octopus salad, the fresh and fishy possibilities for your palate are endless.

Is tourism and social media-provoked travelling negatively impacting our planet? By Ariana Crisafulli



f you're like me, nothing is more exciting than the prospect of an international vacation. Whenever a long holiday approaches, I rack up hours in front of the screen, checking out destinations, activities, accommodations, and flight prices, all the while imagining the magic of being in a new corner of the world (or even a favourite one visited before).

It seems I'm not alone in this travel frenzy. In 2018, there were 1.4 billion tourist arrivals recorded, a 6% rise from the previous year. In fact, tourism has been on the rise for decades. In 1950, there were 25 million international tourist visits, rising to 166m in 1970, and 435m in 1990.

Tourist flights are now in the billions, and these billions of arrivals are landing in a handful of top tourist destinations. In 2017, France received 87 million tourist arrivals, China received 61 million, Mexico saw 39 million, and Thailand saw 36 million; to name just a few popular places. And if you've ever travelled to The Great Wall during Golden Week, you will understand why a saturation of tourism in one location can be a problem.

First off, it's uncomfortable. For everybody. Overcrowding can make what would be a pleasant walk down a picturesque European cobbled street a bit of a nightmare. One might even choose to view the scene from the comfort of one's Airbnb instead of braving the crowds. But hiding out in a vacation rental may even be

causing problems. Homes that sit empty in anticipation for a tourist arrival create housing shortages, and the cost of the rentals may result in rising housing prices for locals.

Of course, a certain amount of tourism can be good for the local economy, helping to create jobs and bring in money. But when we start moving into the realm of overtourism, we begin to see the dark side of the industry.

Hannah Shipley, a 12th Grade student at Concordia International School Shanghai, points to the elimination of natural habitats, displacement of wildlife, and the destruction of the natural/historical beauty of an area when it comes to overtourism. And she's not wrong. Tourists contribute massively to single-use plastic pollution as one example. In beach destinations, tourists have been seen breaking off pieces of coral for souvenirs. The destruction is sometimes more insidious, with throngs of tourists snorkeling while wearing sunscreen that destroys coral reefs. Some smaller places see millions of visitors per year, like Maya Bay in Thailand which was predicted to see 2.5 million tourists in 2018 alone. It was then indefintely closed by officials in June of that year to allow the environment to recover from decades worth of damage.

Even in more urban environments damage can be felt. Ever heard of love padlocks? In some areas, these symbols of romantic love are causing structural damage to idyllic bridges around the world.

One of the major contributing factors of the rise in tourism is the accessibility of travel. Today we have dozens of digital travel services that allow us to create and plan personlised vacations, including setting up it inerary, transportation, and accommodation from the comfort of our couch. The popularity of budget airlines has also made travel more accessible to eve-

> ryone. And of course, the ease with which we can view travel destinations is an important factor. When we scroll through social media like Instagram, Facebook and WeChat, we are bombarded with stunning pictures of vacation destinations and we think to ourselves (or out loud to

our partners), I want to go there! Because who wouldn't want to be in the city of love, planting a love padlock on a bridge with their partner?

#### What can be done?

The phenomenon of overtourism calls for more awareness around responsible travel. Kamdyn Thakur, another 12th Grader at Concordia, defines responsible travel as "being mindful of wherever you are and acknowledging that it is somebody's home." So, when you travel, do as you would at home. Avoid single-use plastics, remember the five R's of waste reduction (reduce, reuse, recycle, recover, and residual management) and be sure to clean up after yourself. Hannah also reminds us that we can be even more proactive when it comes to responsible travel.

"My recommendation would be to try and make as little of an impact as possible when you travel and look for ways to possibly improve your destination. This could be as simple

as picking up trash along the beach or in the water and throwing it away."

The two students have plenty of suggestions when it comes to traveling responsibly. Kamdyn says we can try to offset our carbon footprint from flights by participating in programmes provided by certain airlines. "When airlines ask if you want to chip in a little bit more money to offset your flight, doit!" she says. This money will go toward planting more trees or similar programmes for reducing the carbon footprint. She also mentions that when she and her family go on vacation, they make a conscious effort to seek out ecofriendly activities. "We stay away from riding elephants and try to focus on sanctuaries or rescue places to see elephants or other animals." Hannah suggests that we choose reef-safe sunscreen and to bring reusable items with us. When

she and her family go on holiday, they always try to stay at ecofriendly accommodations. "Some things we look for are places that avoid single use plastics, use solar power, recycle water, or feature saltwater pools."

Both these bright students also believe that social media can be used as a force for good when it comes to travelling responsibly. In fact, it is one of the best tools we have for spreading knowledge and awareness, and these students are learning in school the best ways they can make a positive impact through social media. Kamdyn mentions a project she did recently in her Sustainability and Development class where she created a campaign for buying locally. She believes that this same method can be used to raise awareness about travelling responsibly. So, when you head to your next





travel destination and start snapping those Instagram-perfect travel photos, remember to throw in some messages about sustainability, the local environment, or the culture you are visiting.

On the other hand, sometimes the best (and hardest) thing we can do is to refrain from doing. We all want to show our friends and family the places we've been and the things we've seen, but the damage it could be causing is potentially too high a price to pay for the comparatively small reward of social media approval. When we post, it might be a good idea to avoid adding the location, or to refrain from posting our travel photos on social media at all. Why not instead choose to share these memories with friends and family in person and give an in-person account of your adventure!

Of course, the burden of sustainable travel is not one hundred percent on the shoulders of travellers. Local governments must also take up the reins of sustainability when it comes to the tourism of their country and the wellbeing of their citizens. Some cities are already taking steps towards improving the industry. Bruges, for example, is ceasing advertising for day trips and limiting the number of cruise ships that can dock there. While Majorca is cracking down on unruly tourist behaviour, such as drunk and disorderly conduct, and other cities around the world are changing regulations on love padlocks, with Paris already having begun the removal process.

However, some think that these measures are not enough. Like all new phenomenon, it's hard - if not impossible - to judge the outcome of a new trend. But now that we have begun to see the effects of more accessible travel, we can do more than just address the side effects. Claudio Milano from Ostelea School of Tourism says that what we need to do is redefine tourism and how we understand it.

"For example, do we have gender equality in our tourist industries? Why are men always executives? Are jobs in tourism decent? What about the livability of local residents? It's a question at a political level about how we define and understand tourism," says Milano. In the meantime, we can all do our part to change how we understand tourism and to think about our travels on a grander scale. How are we imagining ourselves when we set off to a new international vacation? As a spectator to a strange new land, or as a citizen of the world who has a responsibility to take care of the planet wherever we go? Too often we believe that, being away from home, we are embarking on a journey without consequences. Instead, we should be thinking about the impact we have and the opportunity for expanding our horizons and perhaps learning something new.

As always, it's the newer generations who will lead the way. The students of today are the ones who are growing up with a new and improved understanding of travel and our responsibility to the planet. I was delighted to hear the confidence in Concordia students who say they look forward to what the future will bring. With enthusiasm, Kamdyn says that her generation, "are going places and will make sure to be more responsible with our travel and find new eco-friendly ways for travelling in the future."

he word 'leadership' can bring to mind a variety of images: An executive, developing her company's strategy to beat the competition. A political leader, pursuing a passionate, social cause. An explorer, cutting a path through the jungle for the rest of his group to follow.

As students progress through school, and indeed their lives, it is their personality that matters, a young person's future earning power is increasingly likely to be determined by whether or not they possess what we used to refer to as 'soft skills' but are now deemed 'non-negotiable', 'essential' skills, rather than their exam results alone.

At Shanghai United International School (SUIS) Pudong, we place equal measure on the importance of both academic and personal skills as these enable our students to be future-ready, lifelong learners. Skills such as leading, being a part of a team, building resilience, and demonstrating commitment are necessary for life and they all require practise. We make the acquiring of these skills achievable through our 'Student Voice'. The Student Voice is a student-run group. At the moment, there are a huge range of projects underway, from student tutoring, football leagues, discussion podcasts, fundraising for breast cancer and orphanages, and website building to name just a few. Each of these projects is being led by students and they have free reign to do what matters to them; the only caveat being that it must enhance the community in some way.

One of the projects happens to be the SUIS Super League (SSL), a studentorganised sports event founded by Billy Zheng(郑家年) that hosts crossgrade tournaments inaugurated on the 4th of September 2019. Members of the SSL express that they hope to create memorable experiences for both students and teachers of SUIS through the common language of sport. The project saw more than 50 students from Grade 6 to A Level Year 2 compete in a series of football matches, including ten student leaders and volunteers for the organisation.

To educate viewers and participants on the reach and mission of the league, the project team developed and launched a functional website whereby match dates and times were regularly updated and shared. It also offered an innovative livestream function to help students from around the campus actively engage in the events. The series of 13 matches produced two champion teams Grade 8 and A Level Year 2 during matches, and all players displayed excellent sportsmanship by respecting opponents and the referee.

Another project is the Light Bulb **Club**, an extracurricular innovation workshop founded by A Level student Joy Zhuang (庄子悦) and IGCSE student Kevin Xu (许珂). The workshop consists of three subject areas, Society, Art and Design, and Technology and aims to develop young SUIS primary students' skills within creativity, as well as other important skills for their future careers and personal development. Joy and Kevin's vision is that the workshop will provide primary students an opportunity to develop into unique, creative leaders.

In the Society subject area, the focus is to encourage students to be logical thinkers, inquirers, and to be caring leaders who are dedicated to shaping a better society. Technology pushes pupils to shape their daring imaginations into real inventions while learning from their mistakes. While Art and Design inspires them to follow their own judgement of beauty, have the courage to express their unique styles, and be open-minded towards the different styles of others.

Joy and Kevin say that the Light Bulb Club matters because it is not solely an opportunity to make their college application sparkle, but more importantly it strengthens their sense of responsibility, communication skills, and patience.

"As secondary students, we learn to communicate with different age groups and in a different manner than with our peers. At school, we are responsible for ourselves, but here we are responsible for others."

Going beyond the curriculum and extracurricular activities, the Student Voice is a special opportunity for learners to discover the things they wish to achieve now and in the future. > magine the world 10 years ago; a world without video calling or beauty apps. Imagine 50 years ago; no internet or instant messaging. Or even 200 years ago; transport on horseback and no formal schooling.

Globalisation is an ongoing process that is shaped by economic, political, and cultural changes. Language, art and ideas have always crossed borders through trade routes and enriched societies. The Industrial Revolution and advancement in technology then accelerated the rate of these cross-cultural communications.

However, these changes have also brought negative consequences. Nationalisation is increasingly prevalent, as historically significant events such as 9/11 demanded discussions on how one's own sense of identity sits in a globalised world. In order to meet society's future needs, with all the challenges and uncertainty that comes with it, it is vital that children develop the necessary skills to thrive. There are many models within educational research that are becoming more recognised and valued. The term '21st Century Skills' and the 'Four Cs' (Critical thinking, Communication, Collaboration, and Creativity) are increasingly being used with the aim impacting all disciplines. For example, critical thinking allows us to approach problems analytically, improve our thought processing and increase resilience in the problems we face, while oral and written communication skills continue to play a central role in our future and development.

In a knowledge-rich economy with an abundance of 'fake news', it is ever more important that we use skills in critical literacy to sift through the information we face. With social media, online learning platforms, and websites, such as Wikipedia, the possibilities of collaborative learning are endless. We understand that collaboration allows us to bring multiple perspectives to solving problems, empowering people through meaningful interactions to create holistic results that benefit the majority.

Author Daniel Pink states, "The future belongs to a very different kind of person with a very different kind of mind-creators and empathisers, pattern recognisers and meaning makers. These people...will now reap society's richest rewards and share its greatest joys." (www.nea.org)

We can also focus skills within the paradigm of wellbeing, global citizenship and sustainability. As society has shifted, we aspire to a more balanced lifestyle, allowing us more time to focus on family, relationships and retaining good health. Sadly, this has also meant that our planet suffers greatly from detrimental environmental impacts, like the burning of fossil fuels, deforestation, and overusing plastic; and with people living longer lives and populations continuing to grow this will only get worse. Institutional Type: State University

Location: Budapest, Hungary

Average Cost of Attendance for non-EU/ EEA Students (including tuition, room and board, etc.): \$13,410 USD

Requirements to be accepted at the University of Veterinary Medicine, Hungary SAT/ACT/IB/A Level Score Range: Admittance is based on the university's entrance exam results in Biology, Chemistry and English, therefore no outstanding scores are needed from high school. Students can apply with a high school leaving certificate that enables them to enter higher education studies. IB students with HL in Biology and Chemistry can get an exemption from the entrance exam if they obtain at least a grade 6.

English Language Requirements (DET/TOEFL/IELTS): English language abilities are tested during the entrance exam in a written test and oral interview.

### Is on-campus housing provided?

The university does not provide on-campus housing, however, the university has a housing service that helps students find a suitable apartment located nearby or in the heart of the city.

### What is the average cost of off-campus housing for students?

Approximately 600-700 EUR (660-770 USD) or less if students choose to share.

### Are merit or need-based scholarships available for international students?

There is a Hungarian state scholarship that covers tuitions fee for students from specific countries. The programme is based on bilateral educational cooperation agreements signed between the Ministries responsible for education in the sending countries and Hungary or between institutions. ### What are the benefits for students attending university in your location?

- International students mainly choose to study veterinary medicine in Budapest because Hungary is known worldwide for its excellent medical education. The tradition of over 230 years mixed with the innovations of modern techniques and facilities gives students great professional advantages, regardless of the country they wish to work in after their studies.
- The university is located in central Budapest, so everything a student needs can be found nearby. As the capital of Hungary, with around 2 million inhabitants, Budapest is the cultural, educational, and economic centre of the country, thus providing a beautiful and historical environment for all visitors and inhabitants.
- Hungary is one of the most affordable countries in the European Union, enabling students to attend a Western university at a reasonable price. Budapest

is also extremely safe and secure, with very low crime rates.

### What is the university renowned for?

As the only veterinary university in the country, everything related to the profession goes through the institution. Professionals who finish their studies here go on to work in zoos, small and large animal clinics, research labs and public offices. The university also has a wide range of veterinary-related research topics. In 2013, the university was awarded the prestigious Research University title for its outstanding research activity. Topics that are related to food chain safety, farm animal treatment and epidemics are especially supported.

### In which countries are students able to work after graduation?

Every European country accepts the degree students obtain at the university. The preparation for the American accreditation has also started, where students will also be able to start working after graduation in the US and Canada.

### What services are provided in helping international students transition into life on campus? The university recognises the extra

pastoral care that international students need, so there is a plethora of student support services available to them. This includes administrative help for freshers, advice regarding accommodation and insurance, assistance with visas and residence permits, mental health counselling services, educational support services, a study-buddy system, groups to help improve learning techniques and overall support regarding life in Budapest.

### What organisations and clubs exist that international students might gravitate towards?

The University has a student association called ISC (International Student Committee). The Student Secretariat and the ISC organise a number of events and activities for international students. One example is International Day, which offers students the chance to introduce their nations' food, drinks, customs, and culture. The campus is full of life and the feast lasts until late. Equus Day offers an opportunity to relax after a dark, cold winter and prepare for the summer exam period, but also helps internationals build relationships and find a new family abroad.

### What are the visa requirements for a student to remain in Hungary to work upon graduation?

Graduates need a job that provides them with a working visa in order to stay in Hungary. Finding a job as a vet in Hungary is not too difficult, but it is useful to speak some Hungarian as many animal owners do not speak English.

### Take better care of yourself:

1. Purchase some decent comfy slippers. When your feet are warm you won't feel the need to have your air conditioner permanently cranked up to 30°C.

2. Invest in a water filter for the bathroom and try to take cooler showers. Trust me your hair and skin will thank you for it! FYI, I tried an inexpensive one from Taobao and it didn't help. Save yourself some time and hassle and just purchase a proper one. Greenwave do a variety of options including full water filters for your bathroom or more affordable shower heads with a filter attached. WeChat: Greenwave666

3. Ditch your summer moisturiser and purchase a winter one! My go to is Liz Earle Superskin Moisturiser which can be found on Taobao. It's cruelty-free, contains high levels of omega-3 and plenty of antioxidants.



4. Protect your immune system and take a multivitamin each day. Try to avoid fried foods and sugars... it will only make you feel worse. Warm root vegetable soups and roasted veggie dishes are high in nutrients, delicious and comforting, and easy to make!

pared a variety of tools and cosmetics and politely requested that I turn over onto my front. Part of DVA's signature methodology is that all clients should have a 10 or 15-minute back and shoulder massage before paying any attention to the face. After my massage, the rest of the treatment consisted of five stages: cleansing, ridding of impurities, massaging, applying a hydrating mask and then moisturising. ### Co Cheese 2

Just over five years ago, a small, cosy, unassuming bar on Jing'an's Yuyuan road opened called Co Cheese, and it quickly built up a loval following. Thanks to its affordable pricing, friendly neighbourhood vibe and great soundtrack, people keep on coming back for more. But perhaps the biggest reason customers keep returning is for its delicious, grilled cheese sandwiches, created by owner Greg. Back in his native home Canada, Greg would experiment with leftover food from his fridge to make creative grilled sarnies, which he then turned into a successful business idea (I've been told that many of the experiments turned out well, but not all of them!). It's not the only place in Shanghai to get a grilled cheese sandwich, but, if you ask me, it is by far the best. Any list that tells of where to get the best grilled cheese in Shanghai that doesn't include Co

Cheese instantly loses all credibility with me. The good news is that Co Cheese has finally opened a second location next to IAPM mall. This bigger space includes comfy banquette cubicles that seat four, a large communal table and a horseshoe-shaped bar. These are definitely nice improvements on the original, but what hasn't changed is the food! On offer are classic fillings like tuna, ham and bacon along with some Asian-inspired options such as the Hongshao (braised pork belly, soy, spices, mozzarella) and Thai red curry meatball with Gouda. I've tried most of the options and I have yet to find one I didn't like.

Beers are available on tap as well as wine and spirits. But a visit to Co Cheese isn't complete without a Pickleback, which is a shot of whisky chased with a shot of Greg's house made pickle brine which neutralises the burn of the whisky.

### La Mesa

There's no shortage of taco options in Shanghai, but La Mesa is as good a place as any to get your taco fix: along with a few other Latin-inspired street food options. I am a huge fan of concepts that like to keep things simple and focus on one or two things that they do well, rather than trying to please everyone; and La Mesa does just that! The taco list is extensive and divided into sections based on filling type - chicken, pork, beef, fish and what they call "Vegie" which appears to be vegetarian. Prices range from 28-38 RMB per taco, but they do offer 2 for 50 RMB which is a good deal. However, I am disappointed they don't offer larger options, as many people might want 3-4 tacos depending on whether it's for dinner or a snack. The two that cried out to me were the Matador (hash browns, fried egg, cheddar cheese and spicy beef... basically a breakfast taco) and the intriguingly named 'A Bone To Remember' which consists of slow cooked pork rib on the bone; this can be easily removed by squeezing the taco while pulling out the bone. Aside from tacos, there are also some salads, sandwiches, and burritos, as well tortilla chips with guacamole on offer. ### Shake

The Shanghai food and beverage market is undoubtedly overcrowded, but Shake offers something very unique. Its supper club concept, inspired by 1960s New York establishments where patrons would spend an entire evening enjoying a nice meal followed by live music is a welcome change to status quo. From its opening three years ago, chef Danyi Gao has been heading up the kitchen with her unique fusion creations with dishes like Thai Beef Carpaccio (88 RMB) - wafer thin slices of fresh beef, with a Thai dressing consisting of peanut, cilantro, mint, fish sauce, calamansi. celerv and daikon: which works surprisingly well even for this die-hard fan of the classic Italian version! We also liked the Sambal chilli potato salad with slow cooked egg(68 RMB) and the only thing preventing my two female companions

from ordering a second helping was that it was rather carb heavy. Needless to say, it didn't stop me! Bigger bites are available till around 9.45pm and there's a late-night snacks menu for night owls.

The cocktail menu is helmed by Colin Tait, who previously worked at Vesper - one of the top cocktail bars in Thailand. In keeping with its New York theme, cocktails include the Godfather Of Soul - a whisky lover's dream of Evan Williams Straight Bourbon, Laphroaig 10yr, Cynar, and Vermouth; something you imagine Don Draper would order when not drinking Old Fashioneds. Most cocktails are priced at 100 RMB which may seem expensive, but these are top shelf concoctions and don't forget you're getting live entertainment as part of the deal. If you prefer spirits to cocktails, they have a decent selection, especially the whisky range which has more than enough to cover most tastes.

Shake tends to be quieter early in the week but gets very busy closer to the weekends when the music also livens up. There can sometimes be a cover charge for big events or holidays so remember to book ahead. Address: 3F, 46 South Maoming Road (near Jinxian Road) Reservations: 021 6230 7175

### Juju

Juju is the latest offering by serial restaurateur Mark Klingspon, owner of The Nest, The Cannery and also Rye & Co, with Juju being his first Asian concept in Shanghai, the concept being Korean BBQ. So, what's different about Juju compared to all the other perfectly fine Korean joints across the city? Well, for one, it is located at 3 on the Bund, but don't be fooled by the address. Juju is far from fancy, fine-dining. Think walls covered in Korean street art, loud 90s hip hop, and old school arcade machines (Donkey Kong, Pac-Man, and my 80s favourite, Asteroids). The menu is simple, focusing on its free flow meat option (288 RMB), which includes just pork and beef, and dishes like Korean fried chicken wings and spicy porkrice. In terms of beverages, it's 200 RMB for a three-litre keg and 50 RMB for Jinro Soju which comes in a variety of fruity flavours. Everyone should also try a Soju bomb, which involves simutaneously dumping a shot of Soju into a glass of beer and then downing it. The emphasis here is most definitely on fun, so, go with a group rather than as a couple. This would also be a great venue to celebrate a birthday for both the young and young at heart (I fall into the latter category).

pon arriving at Zhangjiajie Hehua International Airport, my husband, son and I met our driver and were quickly on our way to The Glass Cube Guest House. Once at our destination, our driver had the unfortunate task of balancing our heaviest bags on a bamboo pole while traversing the dark, steep cliffside, but he made no complaints and we gratefully tipped him.

Sunrise came early, thanks to the sound of a persistent rooster who, seemingly satisfied that his work was done, moved onto the next guest house once we rose from our beds and opened the curtains to greet him. That morning, we immediately set out to Zhangjiajie National Park, an area so immense (11,900 acres) it could easily take more than four days to cover.

We left the throng of tourists and began our hike to Yuanjiajie. After an hour and a half we arrived at the top and were greeted by spectacular views of Hallelujah Mountain and The National Bridge. Not unlike James Cameron's movie Avatar, soaring mountain peaks jut out majestically from the countryside below. Resembling terrain one might discover on an alien planet, it quickly became apparent as to why this area is commonly referred to as the 'Avatar Mountains'. It is truly surprising to find such a setting in deep, rural China.

Concluding our hike, we took the Yangjiajie cable car back down the mountain. Upon the arrival of a group of tourists, mischievous monkeys suddenly appeared in vast numbers, who then quietly stalked us along the perimeters of the walkways. We watched on as they accosted unsuspecting tourists and unapologetically liberated them of any and all snacks they were carrying. This totally reprehensible behaviour, for the most part, is completely forgiven given the fact that they are undeniably adorable. We accepted their continued presence but made our son promise not to pet one, for fear he may come out of the woods with less digits than he went in with.

The next morning, we set out with our driver for the Zhangjiajie Grand Canyon Glass Bridge, known as the highest glass bridge in the world and located just 45 minutes outside of Zhangjiajie City. After crossing the bridge, we donned a pair of gloves and some heavy duty butt padding and jumped into a stone slide that catapulted us down the mountain









and into the canyon below. There we wandered through lush vegetation and along a turquoise river that sparkled like untouched sapphires in the sun, past dark caves, and under rich green vines that cascaded down the cliffs like sleepy serpents. The whole scene was like a page torn right out of the Jungle Book.

Eventually, the path ended, opening up into the mouth of Baofeng Lake where we boarded a boat that slipped silently across pristine waters, barely creating a ripple in the glass like surface below. We sailed past waterfalls, canyons and rock faces crawling with foliage and continuously marvelled at the captivating views surrounding us.

We then travelled onto Tianzi Mountain, where we found Hom, our guide, patiently waiting for us. His knowledge of the area proved unparalleled as he introduced us to some spectacular hidden areas that even the most seasoned guides were clearly neglecting. We also had the scenic spot entirely to ourselves, making it hard not to feel like we were the only people on earth. There we watched as the sun crept across canyons, casting long shadows on the jagged cliffs above and below us and were in awe of how the green trees and shrubs stubbornly cling to the sheer rock face, determined to grow despite their precarious predicament.

After another cable car ride, we climbed to our guesthouse. Fall evenings in Zhangjiajie are nothing short of perfection, as the air is cool and crisp, with an ebony sky above blanketing you in an endless dusting of brilliant stars.

Over the course of our stay we enjoyed dinner outdoors every night, talking with backpackers, fam ilies, and young married couples who had come from all over the world to bear witness to Zhangjiajie's captivating beauty. It never ceases to amaze me how a shared love of travel can quickly turn complete strangers into lifelong friends; and our family was no different. Bonding



with strangers through shared stories about our Zhangjiajie adventures, we all unanimously agreed that there is something truly magical about this remarkable place.

The last part of our journey took us to Tianmen Mountain, just a short onehour drive from our guesthouse. Admittedly, I did a shocking lack of research regarding this portion of our trip, and for that I am grateful as I may not have come. We found ourselves boarding a bus that proceeded to make 99 (they have officially been counted) death defying turns along what must surely be one of the most twisted roads on the planet. The views took our breath away not only because they were stunning but also because these vehicles literally skim the cliff sides they bring you that much closer to the sights. Matching each other's hair-raising speeds, oncoming buses approached with

only millimeters to spare before soaring off in opposite directions, leaving you to wonder how both buses and drivers manage to remain intact without so much as a scratch.

Once we arrived at the top of the mountain, our bravery was immediately rewarded. There stood before us was one of the most celestial images I have ever seen and I fear any description I try to assign it will fail miserably. All I can say with any accuracy is that my spirit completely soared when I bore witness to the majesty of Heaven's Door. It is truly an otherworldly experience. We then slowly walked the 999 steps leading up to the mouth of Heaven's Door otherwise known as Tianmen Cave before stepping onto the world's longest escalator which proceeded to take us up to the highest peak of the mountain. After what felt like an eternity spent floating

The sky above and below stretched into infinity, while the clouds unnervingly floated beneath our feet. My stomach lurched as I peered down at the haunting mist and noted that the canyon floor was some 5,000 feet below. On more than one occasion, my son politely requested that I stop crushing his hand before he chose to abandon me altogether and accompany his calmer and more 'surefooted' father.

Tianmen Mountain features endless walkways, bridges, temples, trees and cliffs. An entire day could easily be spent here, but truthfully, I doubt my nerves could have withstood a prolonged visit. Having hiked and walked almost 20,000 steps and seeing more mind-blowing views than we could possibly capture, we left for the cable car in the hopes of beating the setting sun.

As the mountains grew darker and the magic slowly began to disappear, beckoning reality, I reflected on how fortunate my family has been to travel all over Asia and witness some of earth's most breathtaking scenery. With Shanghai proving to be the perfect base with which to launch our adventures, Zhangjiajie provided the perfect reprieve from busy city life. Offering exceptional beauty and utterly unique experiences, Zhangjiajie will forever be remembered as one of our favourite family vacations in China.

### Moganshan Solvang Village

### STAY

The crisp, clean air of Moganshan, or Mount Mogan, has charmed foreigners and locals alike looking to relax, hike and enjoy the scenic beauty for more than a century. The last decade has seen the area buzzing with exploding popularity. Amid the vast choice of lodgings in Moganshan, from basic guesthouses to luxurious 5-star hotels, family-and-pet-friendly Moganshan Solvang Village is a homely, informal mid-range hotel with double and family rooms, all equipped with bathtubs. It is run by warm and helpful English-speaking staff. The entire construction is done with local stone and timber using the traditional Sun Mao joining technique, where wooden columns and beams are individually shaped to form perfect joints, without nails. Sun Mao is a dying craft and its beauty lies in its simplicity. Solvang Village's surrounding bamboo forests create the perfect tranquil backdrop for some serious relaxation.

### **GETTING THERE**

By public transportation, it takes two hours by train from Hongqiao train station to Deqing station, where, if arranged beforehand with the hotel, a driver will wait to take you to Solvang Village. The drive takes about 50 minutes.





### EXPLORE

Footpaths meander the rolling hills covered with bamboo forests. Visit viewpoints, including the top of Moganshan Mountain and a waterfall in the rainy season, and wander through lots of serene forests. Alternatively, you can explore the area on a mountain bike rented from the hotel, or by paddling in a boat on one of the nearby reservoirs. If you are here simply to enjoy some peace and quiet, sit up on your hotel rooftop with a good book, or in the cosy lounge with a drink. Regardless, Moganshan Solvang Village is the perfect place to catch your breath from the hustle and bustle of Shanghai, either as a couple or a family.

# The Joy of Teaching

Deputy Head of Humanities and Psychology Teacher at top A Level school Ulink College of Shanghai, Adam Romano, elaborates on the pleasures of being a teacher in Shanghai.

### What first brought you to China?

Like many before me, I was at a point in my life when I needed a change of scenery and at the time China felt like it would be a great place to start an adventure.

### How did you come to work in education?

Back when I was studying for my masters, I discovered that if I did some work as a Teaching Assistant the university would offer to fund my degree. Overtime, I found that I wasn't as nervous in front of people as I had anticipated, and I realised I enjoyed teaching. But it wasn't until I started teaching psychology that I really began to love what I do.

### What do you find unique about working in education in Shanghai, and how does it differ to teaching in the US?

Honestly, the respect that teachers gain from students, parents, and the public in general in China is so much higher than where I am from. I think I speak for most other teachers when I say that people often underestimate just how important, demanding, and challenging it is to teach and more importantly to teach well.

### Ulink Education states that it 'prepares students to become global citizens with a Chinese identity', what does this statement mean to you?

For me, this statement means we help young students to feel better prepared for whatever challenges they may face studying, living, and working any where in the world, while also encouraging them to embrace their roots. It's about thinking globally and acting locally.

Are there any educational philosophies you have experienced in China that you think other countries could benefit from? Ifeel that there is this tendency to make a distinction between eastern and western education, when really what people are referring to are the newer, more progressive educational methods and the long-standing philosophies. I've seen plenty of international teachers educate in a very old-fashioned way and many teachers from mainland China teach in a student-centred, innovative way; so, it really is an incorrect assumption. At Ulink College of Shanghai, I have met lots of people who inspire others through their own teaching methods, which collectively helps us all become better educators.

### How do you feel education will differ in fifty years' time?

Education is progressing all the time, so it's difficult to say. However, it's clear that learning will be less restricted to classrooms and the style as to how we as teachers educate will change thanks to modern technology. For example, I often record myself teaching elements of psychology and then upload these clips to YouTube. I also program simple computer games to focus students' attention and further develop learning skills.

### You've been with Ulink Shanghai for ten years, what has been your favourite memory?

My highlight has to be suggesting and supporting the school to add A Level psychology to its curriculum.
