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

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

s parents living abroad, decisions about our children's education can be some of the most stressful and time-consuming that we make. With a myriad of daycare centres, preschool and kindergartens, all featuring a variety of educational philosophies the modern era and diverse city of Shanghai afford to us, it can be a struggle to sort through the noise and find the best fit for your child and family. For anyone with kids between the ages of 18 months to 5-years-old, the options for schooling can be just as vast as those for primary or secondary students, and in some cases, equally as competitive. We are here to take some of the mystery out of this complex process.

Before you can begin to choose a school, you'll want to inform yourself of your options and gather information. A lot of confusion stems from the terminology of the types of schools available, which may be vastly different from how education is organised in one's own country. Another big decision revolves around which educational philosophy best suits your goals for your child or aligns with your own parenting principles. Location, scheduling, contingency plans for primary school plus firsthand information from other parents may come into play when making your decision. First, let's cover some of the types of schools most frequently found in Shanghai.



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Distinguishing Programmes

Kindergarten

There are a few basic types of schools for early childhood, which is considered any schooling before primary begins at age six. Perhaps the most common type in Shanghai is the kindergarten, which is designed for kids aged 3 to 6. Many kindergartens also have a 'nursery' class for 2 to 3-year old children. A distinguishing feature of these schools is that they tend to be programs with 5 full days a week, which can make them more suitable for working parents. These schools also often have a strong academic focus, in preparation for Grade 1. Curriculums will vary by school, of course, so it is important to visit a prospective school and understand their unique offerings. Many kindergartens are bilingual, with both English and Chinese language used. This type of school can be a good stepping stone to a more competitive primary school with an interview enrollment process.



Nursery

Another type of school parents may want to consider for the early years is the nursery department of an international school. International schools are usually geared towards primary school aged children and above. However, many offer a connected nursery department for those children who are too young to begin formal schooling. This can be a great option for parents that had planned to send their child to that particular school in the future, ensuring a smooth, seamless transition to primary school at age 6.

Preschool

Another type of school is typically called a preschool. While some preschools can accept children up to age 6, the general focus of a preschool is younger, around 2 to 4 years old, and they often enroll children as young as 18 months. Preschools often offer more flexible scheduling, like half days or part time attendance each week. The curriculum is also more likely to be play-based and focuses on social and emotional development, with any academics as supplementary. This structure promotes social interaction and growth, with learning resulting naturally through play. It can also be a gentler way to allow young children to adjust to a school environment, structured days and becoming independent. As with kindergartens, there is a plethora of various philosophies and even language programs for parents to explore, ensuring you can find a place suitable to your specifics needs and preferences.





Daycare

There are also a couple daycare programmes in the city, which are typically non-academic, safe and fun places for children of working parents to spend the work days. However, due to the popularity of the family *ayi* as well as multi-generational families, it may be more difficult to find a suitable place for younger toddlers and infants as compared to your home country where daycares for young children of working parents is a more common phenomenon.

Playgroup, or Parent and Me classes

Also called zaojiao (early learning classes), these are typically short classes (from 45 minutes to a couple hours long) designed for children as young as 3 months old and extending up to around 3 or 4-years-old. They are usually offered anywhere from once to three times a week. These classes focus on parent-child interaction and participation in a group. They also help with exposing infants and toddlers to sensory play, music and movement, expression through art, and, of course, socialization. You can often drop-in to these classes making them low-commitment, attending when it is convenient for you and your family, paying as you go. Other classes will ask for payment for a certain number of classes, usually after a trial class. This is a very flexible and casual option for those parents not in need of childcare but simply looking to expose their child to a wider variety of experiences. There are a wide range of topics and skills to be found in this category, from art, music and dancing, to yoga or kungfu, and even various languages.



What Programme Works for You?

Each school or programme typically has their own specific philosophy of education along with a school mission statement, so it is important to confirm that these align with what you are expecting and they are compatible with your own beliefs and goals regarding the education of your children. Shanghai offers a wide range of educational philosophies to choose from. You may have heard of these but are unsure of the meaning or the respective benefits of each. You may be wondering which philosophy might better suit your own children's learning preferences and styles. Let's explore some of the most common educational philosophies you may come across in Shanghai.

Montessori

Montessori is a method of education and model of human development based on the research and work of Dr Maria Montessori. The model is based in the principle that humans develop through interaction with the environment, and that there is an innate path to this development. This means that Montessori schools create an environment that fosters independence within its students, even allowing students to freely choose what activities to work on at any given time. The idea here is that within the proper environment, the child knows instinctively what sort of activities will suit his or her optimal development,



with teachers acting more as a mentor or guide. Children are given a great degree of ownership over the how, what, and why they learn, empowering them to become active learners.

Students' learning is highly personalized, contextual and relevant to the child. This allows the child to become highly motivated to face and conquer challenges. Another unique feature is mixed age classrooms, with the concept that older students can act as role models and teachers to younger children. There are also a variety of Montessori specific materials found in the classrooms to further those aims. Montessori style learning tends to work especially well for young children who are naturally self-motivated and enjoy unstructured, self-directed environments.

Early Years Foundation Stage

This is another curricular framework you might come across frequently in Shanghai. This framework represents the national standards in the UK for early childhood and sets standards for the learning, development and care of children from birth to 5 years old. It provides the teachers and school community a set of common principles and commitments, enabling them provide quality education to young children. It sets out certain expected developmental milestones through seven different areas of learning and development. It also aids educators of young children in providing the correct support, guidance, provisions and environment to ensure students are happy and healthy.

This framework was developed around four guiding principles. A Unique Child - Every child is a unique child who is constantly learning and can be resilient, capable, confident and self-assured. Positive Relationships - Children learn to be strong and independent through positive relationships. Enabling Environments - Children learn and develop well in enabling environments, in which their experiences respond to their individual needs and there is a strong partnership between practitioners and parents and carers. Learning and Development - Children develop and learn in different ways. The framework covers the education and care of all children in early years provision, including children with special educational needs and disabilities. Practitioners teach children by ensuring challenging, playful opportunities across the prime and specific areas of learning and development.

Learning through play and communication is emphasized, as well as the importance of providing a stimulat-



ing and supportive environment where children are able to explore and take risks during their learning process. It also encourages teachers to focus on observing and addressing the individual needs of each unique child.

International Baccalaureate

IB, or International Baccalaureate, was initially developed in Switzerland for international schools and now is world renowned for its high academic standards and emphasis on creativity and critical thinking. It is a programme eventually ending with an internationally recognised IB diploma, which is suitable for entrance to universities and colleges worldwide. But what does this look like for ages three to six? The IB Primary Years Program (PYP) offers a curriculum framework for individual schools to implement through units of inquiry. Within each transdisciplinary unit students are encouraged to explore the topic through a variety of perspectives, ask questions, and let their natural curiosity guide the direction of their study and the learning experiences the teacher provides for them. The programme aims to balance the acquisition of significant and relevant knowledge and skills, the development of conceptual understanding, the formation of personal positive attitudes and the capacity to take responsible actions.

Another key feature of IB learning is the focus on holistic development of the child through the IB learner profiles

and attitudes. In addition to more academic goals, these values, such as cooperation, open-mindedness, tolerance, and reflectiveness, aim to facilitate social, emotional and physical health, perceiving students as whole human beings. The focus is removed from simply building knowledge and skills. Instead, each individual child and their educational needs becomes the starting place for curricular development. When students are mentally and physically active in their learning, not only are they highly engaged, but they are becoming skilled at understanding themselves and their relationship to their own learning as well. This improved understanding and selfcontrol propels children to become highly motivated, curious lifelong learners. An IB school may also be a great fit for children who will continue on to IB international or bilingual schools for their primary or secondary years.

Reggio-Emila

Reggio-Emilia is another style of holistic, child-centered education. While only schools in the Reggio Emilia region of Italy are considered as authentic, there are a number of schools across the world who are Reggio-inspired, including several in Shanghai. Embracing Reggio-Emilia means a school focuses on the seven guiding principles of the Reggio Emilia approach that are critical in distinguishing Reggio-Emilia from similar or competing child-centred approaches to education.



Perhaps the biggest defining feature of Reggio-inspired schools is the focus on the interactions and relationships between students themselves, as a community, with parents and teachers and even with the classroom environment itself. This principle posits that children are collaborators and work best when included in a community as opposed to working independently. Therefore, Reggio-Emilia places an emphasis on working in small groups, which is based on the idea that we form ourselves through interaction with peers, adults, and the world around us.

Another key component is that of expression and communication. Proponents of Reggio-Emilia firmly believe that children should be encouraged to communicate authentically, through a wide variety of media, using a wide variety of materials and resources to explore, understand, wonder, feel, discover, and imagine. This may include expression through words, movement, dance, drawings, paintings, buildings, sculptures, and more. Children are highly encouraged by the teacher to naturally explore and interact with the surrounding environment and each other as they learn their own ways of expression.

Making a Choice

Armed with this information, parents can consider what educational philosophy appeals to them. How do we aim to educate our children for success in this ever-changing world? While it is difficult to sort through so many contrasting methodologies, the diversity of styles and educational philosophies available in Shanghai allows us the opportunity to reflect upon our own values and to determine which ones are important to impart into our children. What do we believe will serve them best in their

futures? Here you can consider things like how much of an academic focus you would like.

Another point to consider is the unique personality and educational needs of your specific child. Is your child highly motivated? Extremely social? Does she do well within a more structured environments with clear schedules, or will she thrive with a more relaxed and self-directed environment? Is he extremely active, requiring plenty of room to explore or would he prefer a quieter environment to better enable concentration? In which areas would your child likely need help, and can the school provide this assistance? Is language an important factor for your family?

Once you have considered which type of school may be a potential fit for your child and your family, you can begin to gather information about which specific schools might be available to you, given your location and budget. You might ask friends and neighbours for schooling suggestions, join a WeChat group or two, or flip through the Shanghai Family School directory. Accessing the wide variety of experiences and knowledge available at your fingertips can help you make a more informed decision. Be sure to note what aspects of a school people are focusing on, whether it's the clean and bright environment, student-teacher ratio or that their child is excited to go in the mornings. Are those aspects relevant to your own priorities?

As you are researching, don't forget to consider the basic practicalities. How far is the school from your home or office? Do they offer a busing service? Are the hours suitable to your needs? These basic considerations might seem mundane, but they can have a huge impact on your daily schedule and your child's experience of beginning school. You'll want to find a school that enables a smooth transition into the learning environment for your child and your family as a whole.

The Visit

After gathering all your options and then narrowing them back down again, its time visit the potential schools on your list. Most schools worth your time and consideration will be more than happy to arrange an appointment for you to visit or inform you of upcoming events or open days for potential students and parents. The tour should include classroom and school facilities as well as enabling parents to observe lessons or children at work and play. As you are visiting, it can also be helpful to take notice of your own impressions and experiences by asking yourself these questions:

Do you feel comfortable and welcome in the learning environment? What about your child?

How are the adults in the classroom setting? Warm and engaged, busy and stressed, bored and detached?

How are the children learning or playing? Do they seem happy, confident, relaxed, and curious?

Is the environment safe, clean, and aesthetically pleasing?

What is the school community like? Is there are strong element of parent participation and involvement?

Being prepared for the visit can help you make the most of your time. Some parents will feel it is helpful to bring a checklist of questions and to jot down answers for later comparison. Here are some questions you may consider asking that can help you get the information you need to make the best decision for your family.

Is the school fully licensed? The teachers? How are teachers supported, trained, and monitored?

What are the safety procedures put in place by the school for drop-off and pick-up?

What is the menu like and how does the school guarantee food quality? If your child has dietary restrictions you can bring this up here as well.

How is discipline handled within the school?

How does communication between the parents, school, and teachers work?

What are the payment options and procedures?



You might also want to ask more specifically about their curriculum, languages taught or other activities offered through the school. Talking with other parents is one of the best ways to get more specific information about a potential school and discover first hand the pros and cons, so don't be shy about asking and sharing any concerns you may have. You'll want to feel as sure of your choice as possible, enabling trust to develop between you, the teachers, and your child. Trust your intuition; if you feel relaxed, happy, or excited about a school, it might prove to be a good choice. Meanwhile if you are feeling apprehensive, there may be something about this school that just doesn't align for your family, even if you can't find an objective reasoning.

Hopefully, armed with this new knowledge about early childhood education in Shanghai, you are now poised to jump right in, ready to make a strong decision for your child. Although it can be an overwhelming and even intimidating process, the good news is that this speaks to the variety of options we are afforded in this diverse metropolis.



Let them Grow

How parenting styles can define a child's character.

arenting is perhaps one of the most daunting professions anyone could do. You never quite master it, you don't get a promotion, or a pay rise, and you certainly are never fully appreciated, but for some unknown reason being a parent is the best job ever! When I was asked to write about parenting styles, I couldn't wait to get my teeth into it, as this very topic has been a much-discussed subject within my friendship circles, mummy groups and family. As a mother of three, I

have embraced a multitude of parenting styles for all three of my children. There have been varying degrees of success and not one was the perfect fit, as each child was unique and different. Additionally, I had to consider their stage of development, needs and age. Consequently, I bounced from one style to another desperately searching for the perfect one.

As our children are a reflection of ourselves, we naturally have an intrinsic need for them to be the best they can be. But as we all know nobody is perfect. Thus, as parents we shouldn't expect our children to be. There are no quick answers when it comes to being the best parent. In case you were hoping that within these pages the magic answer lies, alas you will not find it. Truth be told, "The perfect parent doesn't exist." Successful parenting is not about achieving perfection, instead we should aim to make decisions in the best interest of our children so they may become healthy, happy, welladjusted human beings.

4 Parenting Techniques

Researchers have classified what is an extremely complex subject into 4 simplified categories that have stood the test of time. Diane Baumrind, a clinical and developmental psychologist, was able to clearly identify and categorise four distinct styles in her observations in 1960.

Authoritarian or Disciplinarian

Parents who use strict discipline strategies with very little wiggle room for negotiations and punishment.

- · Communication is one way from parent to child
- · Rules are mandated not discussed
- Expectations are extremely high where failure is not an option

Permissive or indulgent

Opposite to authoritarians, parents who generally allow their children to do what they want with very limited rules, direction, and guidance.

- Pays too much importance on being a friend to their child
- Have very little to no rules and advocates self-regulation and to work out their own problems
- Communication between the parent and child is extremely open-minded and non-judgemental
- Prefers not to advise and deters from giving directions
 Has a very warm and nurturing relationship with their
 children

Uninvolved

Uninvolved parents give children lots of freedom and generally stay out of their way.



- No discipline style is utilised. Children are allowed to do what they want, probably out of lack of information or concern
- · Communication is limited
- Parents offer very little nurturing
- There are few and no expectations of children

Authoritative

Parents that are reasonable and nurturing and set high, clear expectations. Children with parents who demonstrate this style tend to be self-disciplined and think for themselves. This style is thought to be most beneficial to children.

- Disciplinary rules are clear and the reasons behind them are clear and explained
- Communication is frequent and appropriate to the child's level of understanding
- Authoritative parents are nurturing
- Expectations and goals are high but clear, and children can provide input into the goals.

And while you may see yourself in some of these descriptors, it is important to note that parenting is never a one size fits all static approach but most of us find ourselves somewhere in the middle, sharing some of the characteristics from all parenting styles. Also, if you haven't already seen the movie "Parenthood," I urge you to. Like its name's sake title, it's a fabulous fun movie that includes all the above parental techniques in a gently comic way.

How do You Define Your Parenting Style?

Generation X (people born between 1965-1980) and Generation Y (Millennials born between 1981-1996) have been categorised as having an unprecedented level of overprotectiveness regarding parenting. Parents that rush to school at a whim to deliver forgotten homework or P.E. kits, who challenge teachers over report cards, and mastermind friendships and interfere on the playing field. As writer and teacher Jessica Lahey states, 'Even though these parents see themselves as being highly responsive to their children's well-being' Lahey recommends stepping back and allowing children to embrace failures and accountability for their actions.

Like a painting, each child is like a blank canvas, each stroke of colour that's applied begins to develop a foundation in which a child grows and moves towards building their own unique self and individuality. Your role as a parent is to teach and mould your child through your actions. You are your child's first and most important role model. Your behaviour, character and emotion are your child's biggest influence in their social, cognitive, emotional, and physical development. What you do matters as they love to imitate everything you do.



Understanding the different parenting styles

Many parents today are attempting to raise star children. Their primary desire to have their children thrive and succeed can come at a very high cost. It leaves very little room for their children to make mistakes and learn from them. Over parenting, or the latest buzz word, 'helicopter parenting', is widely prevalent amongst Generation X and Generation Y parents. Research suggests that this form of parenting has an adverse outcome. Instead of developing independent, self-confident children that are willing to take risks, they encourage their children to feel more anxious and they can't do anything for themselves. They can develop a fear of failing, and at the same time, a feeling of entitlement.

Helicopter parenting

Most people have heard of it by now, the 'helicopter parent.' The term is used to define a certain type of parent who hovers around their children, over protecting them and failing to instil a sense of independence and a can-do attitude. In summary they micromanage and rescue their children from ever making any mistakes.

Free-Range Parenting

Free range is the opposite to helicopter parenting. Free range parents happily give their children the freedom to experience the natural consequences of their behaviour within safe parameters. Free range parents believe that minimal supervision fosters independence, confidence, and greater autonomy. This does not mean that parents need to eliminate boundaries, but children should have the freedom to experience the natural consequence of their behaviour.

Free range vs helicopter

Most parents naturally want the very best for their children. The fact is whether you're a helicopter parent or a free-range parent, one or the other is not fixed or absolute. What may seem like a good choice for you may not be a good choice for your child. Consider a balanced approach to parenting that considers your child, their needs, and their social and cognitive developmental stage. A good suggestion is blending and balancing both styles by taking a step back and giving your child the opportunity to face consequences and failures with the hope that they won't repeat the same mistakes.

Give Them Space to Grow and Learn

Children have a natural desire and propensity to learn about the world and the effect they have on their environment. Once born, babies make neural connections in their brains from daily experiences. Children as young as three months show a natural curiosity and use all heightened senses to explore the world around them. They thrive when given the opportunity to engage in open-ended activities. They will examine objects by using their natural senses of looking, touching, listening, and moving it to learn how they can influence the world around them. Allowing your children to explore the world around has exponential benefits as it stimulates important neural connections in the developing brains. It provides cognitive development to occur, giving children the opportunity to enhance their critical thinking by problem

solving, and the ability to make decisions. The ideal way to encourage this well needed cognitive development is by giving them ample opportunities through exploratory play.

Play comes in many forms in your child's development. Even when they are playing alone (independent play), your child is exploring and learning about themselves. Independent play encourages your child to be creative, to problem solve, to learn what they're good at, and therefore builds confidence and self-management skills.

Activate their Five Senses


By creating a 'YES' environment where your child uses their five senses to see, touch, smell, hear and taste you are giving them permission to explore freely. This has a two-way positive impact on your relationship with your

child. When you allow your child to explore freely, you are in essence creating a safe environment and making them feel secure. A feeling of trust is bestowed upon them, empowering them to become self-confident individuals, ready to brave the great new world.

Furthermore, it's imperative that we let our children know that whatever mistakes, wrong decisions, and wrong turns they may make in life, these will not hinder or define them. Instead, it will lead them on their own path of self-discovery and allow them to develop their own unique individuality and character. Also, don't forget to give the movie "Parenthood" a go. If you're anything like me, you'll probably end up watching it from time to time just to see what parental strategy you're currently using.

Colca offers plenty for your child to enjoy. The Peruvian restaurant on Hengshan Road and also at the North Bund provides interesting dining options, perfect for the little ones. They also offer Cheese Sticks with Guacamole Dip (48 RMB) and also Just Pancakes that are fluffy and naturally sweetened

with maple syrup (48 RMB). Unfortunately, their kids menu is only available on the weekends.

Guilt-free snacks for the whole family

re you in search for healthy snack ideas for your family? Maybe you are looking for something you can whip up from your pantry that can be healthy, nutritious, and wholesome? We got your back! Snacking smart will keep your energy level up and make your tummy satisfied. These delicious treats will not only satisfy every member of the family, but it could also be a crowd pleaser for parties. These recipes require little to no preparation, and will take snacking to a whole different level of yummy.

Berrylicious Crumble Bars

For the crust:

- -200 grams old-fashioned rolled oats
- -60 grams rice flour
- -85 grams sugar
- -2 tablespoons coconut flour
- -1.5 teaspoon baking powder
- -1 teaspoon cinnamon
- -Half a teaspoon salt
- -80 grams cold butter (cubed)
- -2 tablespoons almond butter
- -2 tablespoons unsweetened maple syrup
- -1 teaspoon vanilla extract
- To prepare the filling, in a pot add all the ingredients and simmer for about 10 to 15 minutes until it reaches jam-like consistency. Remove from the heat and let it cool.

For the filling:

blueberry, raspberry)

-2 tablespoons sugar

-350 grams of berries (strawberry,

-2 tablespoons unsweetened maple

-2 teaspoons freshly squeezed lemon

- To prepare the crust, place dry ingredients in a food processor and pulse it. Next add in the wet ingredients and pulse again until a crumbly mixture forms.
- Preheat the oven to 175 degrees Celsius. Prepare your baking dish by lining it with parchment paper.
- Press ¾ of the mixture into a prepared baking dish, and into every corners.
- Pour berry mixture on top of the crust.
- $\begin{tabular}{ll} \begin{tabular}{ll} Generously sprinkle the remaining crumble on top of the berry mixture. \end{tabular}$
- 7 Bake for 30 to 35 minutes. Let it cool at room temperature for at least an hour. Carefully, remove from the dish and cut into nine equal bars.

- 45 grams almond butter
- -65 grams brown sugar
- -1egg
- 1 teaspoon vanilla extract
- 45 grams coconut flour
- Half a teaspoon of salt
- Half a teaspoon of baking soda
- 70 grams semi-sweet chocolate chips (I used mini ones)

- Preheat your oven to 175 degrees Celsius.
- Prepare your baking tray with parchment paper or baking silicon matt.
- In a mixing bowl, combine melted butter, almond butter, egg, and vanilla.
- Next add in the dry ingredients, brown sugar, coconut flour, salt, and baking
- Lastly, fold in the chocolate chips into the mixture.
- With your clean hands, make six equally sized cookies and place them on the baking tray.
- Bake cookies for 10 minutes.
- Place them on a cooling rack at least 30 minutes.



- 100 grams old-fashioned rolled oats- 55 grams unsweetened cocoa powder
- -1 teaspoon of baking powder
- -1 teaspoon ground cinnamon
- Pinch of salt
- 20 grams melted unsalted butter
- 1 mashed banana
- 1 teaspoon vanilla extract
- 120 ml unsweetened maple syrup
- 30 grams chocolate chips (I used mini ones)

Preheat oven to 175 degrees Celsius.
Prepare a baking tray with parchment paper.

- In a large mixing bowl, mash the banana and add the ingredients except chocolate chips. Combine the ingredients well, then gently fold in the chocolate chips.
- With clean hands, make six equally sized cookies, or you can use an ice-cream scoop and place them on a baking tray. Gently flatten the cookie dough with the back of a spoon.
- In a preheated oven, bake 10 minutes.
- 5 Cool on a cooling rack after baking for at least 20 minutes.




No-bake Energy Bites

- 75 grams walnuts (unsalted)
- 36 grams almonds (unsalted)
- 5 pitted dates
- 15 grams cocoa powder
- 1 teaspoon vanilla extract
- Pinch of salt

Place all the ingredients in a food processor except chocolate chips.

- bly rather than sticky add water and process it again. Additional moisture helps to stick all the ingredients together.
- Transfer the dough into a bowl, and gently fold in the chocolate chips.
- With your clean hands, roll them into bite-sized balls.
- 5 Store them in an airtight container and keep them refrigerated. It should last for a week.



s the weather is getting warmer, my family is really excited to explore places surrounding Shanghai. On the first trip of the year, we decided to start exploring water towns. There are many famous water towns near Shanghai and it seems that people usually visit the towns one at a time depending on the popularity, location or sceneries. However, we decided to take advantage of the pleasant weather and chose to visit three water towns in one weekend. With careful research and planning, it is a perfect way to spend a weekend getaway with your family and friends.

Zhujiajiao

Our first stop was Zhujiajiao, because it was convenient to reach without any hassle. Simply take Shanghai Metro Line 17 and alight at Zhujiajiao station. It is an ancient water town in Qingpu District, which has almost 1,700 years of history. It was great way to kick off our journey.

Upon entering, it is easy to take a boat ride along the canals, but it is recommended to take a stroll around the town first while admiring those century old buildings and their beautiful details.

Kids will be immediately distracted with artisans making sugar art which can be made-to-order on the spot. It's really interesting to see those little faces focusing so much on how they make these figurines while waiting in line so patiently. Although you will get to see many souvenir shops along

the river, I was most intrigued by the street food. One of the famous dishes is braised pork wrapped in palm tree leaves. It is savoury (goes well with white rice), a little sweet and it melts in your mouth. Secondly, you should try the local zongzi which is popular in Zhujiajiao. When you walk along the streets, you can't escape the fragrant smell. This is one local bite you will have to try. It's mouthful after mouthful packed with flavour. Needless to say, put your low-carb diet on hold. If the zongzi doesn't fill you up, you can try snacks from some of the other vendors such as, sweet breads, deep fried dough cookies...you won't get hungry in Zhujiajiao.


Street snacking aside, there are also various cafe's and restaurants you can explore.

Wuzhen


The town is picturesque and its small network of *longtang* (alleyways) are so beautiful, you will want to wander around. You will be surprised to find some hidden gems, like a flower field which we discovered that was breathtakingly gorgeous.

Of course, walking along the very narrow longtang side by side with someone can be tricky. This is one Instagram-worthy photo you don't want to miss posting on your feed. Another thing you cannot miss while in Wuzhen is experiencing the tea houses. You may choose to visit a traditional or modern tea house along the water's edge. Order a cup of steaming green tea (sunflower seed is commonly on the house) and watch the boats go by.



Some of the tea houses have pretty terraces overlooking the water.

If you are travelling with your little one, taking a boat ride is a must-do in the evening. The evening river views of Wuzhen is stunning. Some boats offer an in-boat dining experience, while taking the boat ride which is a one-in-a-lifetime moment to enjoy.





Pupil Dilation and Cycloplegia

When your child receives an eye exam, your eye doctor may recommend to use eye drops to dilate and cycloplege their eyes. This is a normal part of a routine eye exam, and side effects are generally mild. The dilation of the pupils allows for a clear view of the retina, the back section of the eye, to check the overall eye health. Cycloplegia refers to the temporary relaxation of the muscles that control accommodation, which allows for a much more accurate refraction (measurement of near or far sightedness and possible astigmatism). The side effects of pupil dilation and cycloplegia are light sensitivity and difficulty focusing up close for around half to a full day, depending on which medication is appropriate for your child. It is a good idea to bring sunglasses for your child to wear after the visit.

The accommodative system of the eyes allows for focus to shift between longer and shorter distances. When your eyes are focused further in the distance, accommodation is relaxed, and when you shift your focus to a near target, accommodation is engaged. More accommodation is needed for closer distances. Children have stronger accommodative ability in their eyes than adults do, and it can often be difficult for them to fully relax their accommodation on their own. If their accommodation is engaged, the refractive error in their eyes will appear more minus, which means less farsighted for a farsighted child, and more nearsighted for a nearsighted child. Having an inaccurate measurement of refractive error would be detrimental for visual development, which is why using eye drops for pupil dilation and cycloplegia is recommended for a complete eye exam.

Amblyopia

One of the most important conditions to screen a child's eyes for is amblyopia, commonly referred to as "lazy eye." A person who has amblyopia is unable to see clearly even when wearing corrective lenses, in the absence of other eye disease. Amblyopia can occur in one eye only, or both eyes



together. It is very difficult to know when a child has unilateral amblyopia without a complete eye exam, since the other eye will have clear vision and the child will appear to not have any visual problems. A high refractive error, strabismus (misalignment of the eyes), or conditions such as congenital cataract or ptosis (droopy eyelid) can all cause amblyopia.

The earlier the treatment for amblyopia is initiated, the faster the vision will improve. There is a critical developmental period for vision which lasts from birth until around 8 years old, after which it is extremely difficult to stimulate visual acuity to improve. The prevalence of amblyopia in children is high. Treatment involves first correcting any refractive error by wearing glasses, and often covering one eye with a patch and using visually stimulating activities. Shanghai United Family Hosptial offers the Doboso visual rehabilitation program to help patients recover their vision not just from amblyopia, but certain types of strabismus and visual fatigue as well.

Myopia (Shortsightedness)

Although the majority of children are hyperopic (farsighted) when they are very young, the amount of hyperopia will gradually decrease and many children will become myopic around age 6 and older. Limiting screen time, maintaining proper posture and distance from reading material, and bright

ambient lighting are all important for controlling the progression of myopia, however, increasing the amount of time a child spends outdoors is continually recognized as a key variable for myopia control in research studies. Three hours of outdoor activity a day is recommended for the best results, but even if three hours cannot be attained, getting your child outdoors and exposed to sunlight for a shorter amount of time could still help. Stay safe, wear a mask and remain cautious, but taking walks outside, riding a bicycle, having a picnic, and doing nature scavenger hunts are all good ways to incorporate more outdoor time into a child's life. Make sure to schedule routine eye exams every 6-12 months (depending on the speed of myopia progression) to check the updated status of the eyes.














Reclaiming Family Spaces

chools equip us and our kids with life skills like counting and cooking, but in my opinion, the knowledge of tidying up after ourselves warrants a curriculum

too. Although most of us are blessed

with ayi in China, learning to return things after we are done and letting go of items that no longer serve are skills that will benefit our physical and mental spaces. Tidying tips are therefore usually picked up from home. If your caregiver was tidy, chances are

you will be too. Unfortunately, the opposite is true too. My late mother, bless her, used to think tidying meant buying more storage containers until we realized much later that they were just temporary band-aids.




Abracadabra, It's Spring! By Anne Sibley O'Brein

e put a lot of weight on early education. Which is fair. Reading, writ-

ing, math...all good stuff. Plus, a great number of studies show that starting school early has clear benefits to learning. Fair enough. But while Kindergarten or Grade 1 are important, they're clearly not the defining factor in who your kid is, they still have lots of time and potential to grow his intellectual prowess.

My kid is in Grade 1, and to be honest, I'm not super concerned about his academic performance. I worry more about how he is on the playground, or how he handles challenges to his ethics. For me, primary school provides

great exposure to his growing, malleable sense of self. Ultimately, it helps build character.

Early education is also important in fostering personal responsibility. My kid's teacher is pretty awesome at that. She encourages kids to care for their own personal belongings, and to meet deadlines. It's working. I can already see a strong sense of consequences developing in my son, and he's clearly growing more independent. Respect.

But outside of developing his sense of responsibility and social skills, my only real motivation to push him academically is so he stays on par with the other kids in his class. I don't really care if he's colouring inside the lines.

I will be more concerned, if he's the only kid in his class who can't colour inside the lines. Like when his art is up on the classroom wall, and it's the only one that's all mashed-up, that might irk me a little.

Too often we try and make our kids achieve just so we can look good, and too often we are angry at our kids for failing because they make us look bad. I think that there's a philosophical balance in there we need to explore. If my kid falls behind the rest of the class, I feel bad. I want to see him learn. Learning is cool. I respect the process.

So now I'm at home crushing my kids homework till like 7:30 or 8 p.m. so he can stay on par with the other kids (or hopefully exceed it). Which sucks because I work all day and instead of beer, I get to look forward to doing "6 x 3=18" for like forty minutes until the kid kinda gets it. Homework sucked when I was in school. It sucks for my kid right now. At some point, I straight-up reassess our priorities, and assume the time honored tradition of "screw it".

Let's watch a movie, or go out for dinner. No learning outcomes today man. A bit of leisure could do us both good. Lay back in the beanbag chair, eat nachos, and play street fighter. Nesta will at some point know "6 x 3=18".

But he has to make that decision himself, and it has to be guided in the right way. Play-based learning opened my eyes.

wo years ago, when I was sharing my daughter's future education plans with my mum, she just looked at me and said, "why don't you just let her enjoy childhood". At that time, I was enrolling her in weekday mummy & me classes that she takes with the nanny, and weekends we would be taking her to swimming and crafts class, trying to give her an advanced start. Knowing how competitive seats were for school enrolment, I even made a non-refundable down payment for reserving a spot in a Pre-Kindergarten (for when she turned two and a half) while she was only 10 months old (don't judge, she was born in a somewhat prosperous zodiac year and I wanted to be certain we had a spot).

We had a good plan going. But it did not account for game changing disruptions like COVID-19. With all the structured classes cancelled, I was also getting anxious about my ability to homeschool. By the third week, I had the sense to hire a private tutor to help me. This set-up is not how I would have imagined my daughter's first foray to proper learning, but this was a welcomed change.

Pretty soon, some of my mummy friends also joined the private tutoring session in our living room. These home sessions were fun, especially watching the little ones learning to interact with each other, exploring the teacher's magical bag of teaching aids and ransacking my living room. Don't get me wrong, they learned, but the method of getting them to learn was through curiosity and play. The kids were allowed to explore, take their own breaks and ask questions. Ouite different than the school I selected for her.

They played, sang, crafted, and learned along the way. These kids traded toys and learned emotions by experiencing them. These kids were not forced to participate in group activity, or to memorize their 1,2,3's. I realized then that all my planning for my daughter's education was based on my own childhood. Instead of giving her the confidence to shine in school, I was preparing her to excel by conforming to the classroom.

Mum was right, they do not need to have their early education years filled with anxiety. All they needed was to
